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Introduction

Dear feminists and feminist-interested folks,

Welcome to the Feminist Futures Festival – the largest internationalist gathering of left-wing feminists and feminist-interested folks in Germany for many, many years. We look forward to four days of encounters, debates, networking and impressions, a lot of learning together, laughing and dancing. The future will be feminist if we make it that way – undivided (#unteilbar) and strengthened in our everyday lives.

The festival should be a contribution to strengthen a left, emancipatory force in these times of right-wing threat and continuing economic, ecological and care crisis. A force that advocates a good life for all beyond capitalism. And which calls out a clear „No pasarán“¹ to the authoritarian, right-wing and neo-fascist parties and movements worldwide.

We have put together a varied programme from a large number of ideas. Unfortunately, space and resources are limited, and one or the other topic will certainly be lacking. However, we see the festival as one step in an international, long-term and broad process of organisation and networking. We will need more places and encounters. Therefore, the times and spaces beyond the actual programme are also important so that we can get to know each other and make connections.

We hope that at the end of these days we will go home inspired and strengthened and that we have met people with whom we will stay in contact in the future (see last page). With this festival we want to send a clear signal against all those who try to limit our possibilities to live. Let's take to the streets together on Saturday, September 14th! More details can be found in the programme.

For the time here in the „Zeche“ (colliery) we wish for an atmosphere in which we can meet openly and in solidarity. We all come from different contexts and with different experiences. We want to be careful with them, ask questions openly, but also be able to express uneasiness.

Our feminism is anti-racist!

We are not free until all of us can live in freedom and safety. The latter particularly affects people who are not taken for granted because of their alleged or actual origin. For example, those who do not have a safe place to stay or who, as undocumented care workers, are exposed to racism and sexualised violence on a daily basis. We find it particularly threatening that right-wing and fascist forces in Europe are increasingly referring to „women's rights“ in order to rush against refugee migrant men or Muslims. As if feminist demands were common sense of members of a white majority in society, or even a reality in practice. That is not the case! The rights of women* and Queers* are abused to justify racist policies from conservatives and rightists to the centre of society. This is not the only reason why it is essential to

stress again and again that our feminisms are anti-racist. We do not let ourselves be divided! At the festival we also want to exercise an anti-racist practice together. We understand it as a learning space in which violent, racist ideas are broken up and we ourselves become sensitive to where we have racist images in our heads. We want to show solidarity and try to unlearn these racisms. For this it is important that in our conversations and discussions we let migrants, People of Color, Blacks and refugees speak for themselves; and that we are careful with culturalisations, to avoid repeating stereotypical images of people (unintentionally) just because they do not look ‚German‘, white or Christian. For solidarity it is important to listen to people who talk about their experiences of racism and not to question them. People who are not taken for granted in Germany and Europe often struggle with the fact that their experiences of racism are not taken seriously in everyday life and are thus denied. The Awareness Team is there to help you with questions and uncertainties. In case of racist incidents you can turn to them with confidence.

Feminism means celebrating gender diversity!

For many it has been a long struggle in a male world to be recognized as women*, with different biographies and their own problems.² To this day this has not been fulfilled. Women* still do most of the caring work without being recognised in the pension calculation. Women’s old-age poverty is shocking. At the same time, those who deviate from traditional roles, whose bodies do not fit seamlessly into the boxes “woman” or “man”, experience that gender relations are going hand in hand with a great deal of coercion and violence.

Feminist and Queer movements have been opposing this for years and all over the world. This will also be central to the festival. We will talk about the social reality of women* and about a future beyond the gender binary and the violent heteronomy. Because we want to fight for this future. We can start with that today!

We want the festival to be a place where we treat our differences respectfully. This also includes respecting the sexual self-identification of the participants. Many people identify themselves with the gender assigned to them at birth and feel correctly addressed by the pronouns „she“ or „he“. For others, such assignments are less or not self-evident. As what we identify ourselves is not necessarily viable on a first glimpse.

That is why we have left room on the name tags for the pronoun you use. This should make it easier for us to be addressed as we wish. Please respect even if people do not use pronouns at all. In this case you could simply say their name: „Rosa told in the workshop that Rosa organises strikes at the school Rosa is working on“.

Let’s make sure together that we make the festival as inclusive as possible and at the same time create an error-friendly atmosphere. Some participants are already proficient in gender-sensitive language, others are not. Perhaps they deal with it for the first time. There should be understanding for this, too. The good will and the willingness to learn and to recognise each other count! If you don’t know some terms and ways of speaking, take a look at GLOSSARY, maybe you’ll find an explanation there.

² We use an asterisk behind the word women – that is, women* – to make it clear that the term refers to a range of diverse gender identities, physicalities and self-concepts. With the * we try to meet this diversity in terms of content and language.

For feminist class politics!

After all, questions of gender justice and social struggles belong inseparably together for us. We are not interested in bringing one percent of women* into top positions, but rather in tackling exploitation on the labour market and the devaluation of care work and fighting for a good life for all. Feminist class politics want to be an answer to neoliberal politics. They want to find answers to competition, social division and attacks on social infrastructures.

Some leftist and feminist traditions have poorly recognized or even made invisible different social positions and possibilities. It is important for us to put the concerns of women* and Queers* who live in insecure conditions, work poorly paid or are unemployed at the centre of debates and struggles. It is important for us to pursue the fundamental change of these working and living conditions as an important feminist concern. So labour struggles in so-called women's occupations, in precarious areas, are seen as struggles of a feminist movement. The feminist strikes show how this can work. Only if we put economic violence and exploitation on the feminist agenda our feminism can be inclusive. And only then can it fight for an alternative to capitalism.

We hope that the festival will be a place where class differences can also be recognised. Often feminist spaces are dominated by those who have studied or are studying in academia and come from middle-class contexts. For example, if you want to talk to people, you can ask: „And why did you come to the festival?“ instead of asking „And what did you study?“.

To make sure we understand each other language-wise, we asked many interpreters to support us. The festival languages are English, Spanish and German. But we can't have professional interpreters in all the workshops. We ask you to support our shared multilingualism thus people who do not speak any of the three languages can also take part in our debates. We have left a space on the name tags where you can write down the languages you speak and into which you could translate for others. Please clarify at the beginning of the workshops whether everyone can speak in the languages offered. Otherwise arrange for translations.

We are looking forward to a wonderful feminist festival!

Information from A to Z

Alcohol

We ask you to make sure that the consumption of alcohol is okay for other participants in your immediate environment and that it does not get out of hand. At the kiosk downstairs in hall 12 and at the coffee-bike (in front of the SANAA building) alcoholic beverages will be offered.

Animals

We value every living creature on this earth. However, please leave your pets and animals at home if possible. If you need them for support or accompaniment, they are of course welcome! If you came with animals, we would like to ask you to be mindful of your fellow human beings and the environment.

Assistance

If you need assistance, please contact the info point. There we try to find someone who can support you.

Awareness/Respectful Handling

We see the festival as a place of attentive and respectful interaction with each other and demand the same from all participants. The Awareness AG has developed a concept which you can see at the info point. Here you can inform yourself about what Awareness exactly means and how we want to handle it at the festival. If you are affected by exclusionary, discriminatory, cross-border or violent behaviour or if you are not well, you can contact the persons of the awareness structure. Even if you notice such behaviour in your environment, you are welcome to contact them. You can reach us by phone at +49 157-87375132.

The awareness structure only works with your help – please register at the info point for awareness shifts.

Barriers

The area is largely barrier-free and Hall 12 and the SANAA building are equipped with elevators. The A1 and A2 car parks offer designated parking facilities for people with disabilities. Low-barrier toilets are located on the 24-metre level of the coal washer at the Ruhr Museum (accessible by lift) and in the CASINO Zollverein restaurant. If you need sign language, contact us and we will try to organize it for you. The same applies to other hindrances: Contact the info point and we will find a solution.

Book Table

In Hall 12 there are two book tables where you can buy books on various feminist and political topics.

Bus Stop

There is a small „bus stop“ for people staying at the campsite. If you don't want to walk the route to the campsite alone, just wait there for other campers and then set off together. We

would like to encourage you – especially in the dark – to take advantage of this opportunity. The bus stop is located in front of Hall 6 on the edge of the Kunstwiese.

Campsite

You can sleep at the campsite for 10 € per person per night. The campsite can be reached within 20 minutes walking from the festival site. There are two areas on the campsite: One area is open for lesbians, gays, bisexuals, trans*, inter*, queers (LSBTIQ*) and women*. The other area is open to all.

Sanitary facilities and showers are available. You can register for the campsite at the registration desk in Hall 12 or at the campsite itself. At the registration you can pay directly and get an extra ribbon for the campground.

Children and young people

Children and young people of all ages are warmly welcome! On the one hand, they should have the opportunity to participate in a good feminist program. More detailed information can be found at the tent on the Kunstwiese and at the info point. On the other hand, we offer qualified childcare to give parents and caregivers the opportunity to take part in the festival.

The childcare hours are Thursday from 16:00–20:00, Friday from 10:00–14:00 and 15:30–19:30, Saturday from 10:00–13:30 and 14:30–19:30 as well as Sunday from 11:00–14:30.

Chill-Out-Area

The festival should be an open place for networking and exchange. Hall 12 will be available from Thursday evening to Saturday evening for discussions and resting or hanging out. There will be sofas, tables and benches as well as a small café. There will also be seating and resting facilities on the Kunstwiese near Hall 6 and on the meadow in front of the SANAA building.

Donations

We tried to keep the financial hurdles for the festival as low as possible for as many people as possible. But for those who can afford it, we ask for a donation according to their own estimation. Recommended: 5–15 € per day, open end.

The donation can be made at the registration.

Drinks and Coffee

In several places you can get hot and cold drinks. The kiosk on the ground floor of Hall 12 offers drinks, and you can also buy drinks in the outdoor areas. Water is of course available free of charge to everyone, also the tap water is perfectly safe to drink.

First Aid

If you need medical care, please contact the info point in Hall 12, where we can organise initial care and give advice on nearby doctors, hospitals and pharmacies. In an emergency, please dial 112!

Food – Küfa (kitchen for all)

During the festival the kitchen Mobkit cooks for us and provides us with breakfast, lunch and dinner. The food is prepared with organic and regional ingredients and is vegan. Donations are welcome. Food is only available if everyone helps – be there slicing, transporting, serving and washing up! Please enter your name in the shift plans at the info point.

Garbage

Please make sure to dispose of all rubbish in the designated rubbish bins and to keep the area clean.

Info Point

There is an info point on the ground floor of Hall 12 which will be permanently occupied. Here you can inform yourself about updates, changes in the program and other organizational questions. There is also a telegram channel with updates throughout the festival. The title is Info: FemFutures (<https://t.me/FeministFutures>).

Interviews

Please make sure to give interviews only to people who are either part of the festival or registered journalists. These people will be able to authenticate themselves accordingly.

Lost & Found

At the info point in Hall 12 there is a box with lost and found items. Lost, forgotten and found items are stored there.

Market of Opportunities

In order to give the countless projects, initiatives and activists space to present themselves, there will be a „Market of Opportunities“ in Hall 12, where flyers and brochures will be available for browsing and getting to know each other.

Morning Sun

With enthusiasm into the day! Friday and Saturday morning from 9:00 am and 9:15 am you can choose between singing with the SHE Choir and light kickboxing or yoga. You can find out the exact locations at the info point!

Participate

In many aspects we depend on your help: taking care of info point, awareness shifts, moderation material, safety shifts, entrance, washing up, helping at the kitchen and much more.

Lists to sign up for helper shifts can be found at the info point in Hall 12. Friday and Saturday morning at 9:00 hrs there will be a helper meeting at the info point. Come by and join us!

Photos

There are different reasons why people don't want to be filmed or photographed. At this point we urge you to handle your photos and films responsibly, so that the rights in one's

own picture is protected. Drones or the like are absolutely undesirable. However, there will be professional photographers who will document the events on our behalf. If you do not want to be photographed by them, please let them know.

Site

The Zeche Zollverein is a UNESCO world cultural heritage site. Please be extremely careful with the area and the buildings on it.

Place for Rest

If you really need some rest or if you're not feeling well, you can retire to one of the rooms behind the bathrooms in Hall 12. In case you can't find them, ask the info point. The two rooms are unfortunately quite small, so they're not meant for chilling out, but for time-out.

Registration

We ask you to check in at the registration desk upon your arrival. This is for accounting reasons and to keep track of who is part of the festival. The registration desk is located in the foyer of hall 12, where you will get a festival ribbon and further information.

Security

Everyone should have a good time during the festival. However, if there should be disturbances from outside, we will be able to act. Especially in the area of the campsite and on the paths around the festival area we will make sure that everyone can move safely. In case of incidents or conflicts, please contact the organizing team or the info point. There will also be a mobile phone number. Contact and information will be available at the info point. Please get involved here as well → see the point Participate.

Smoking

We ask you to throw your cigarette ends in the ashtrays and in the garbage. Please keep the area clean and consider your non-smoking environment. (E-)cigarettes are no exception.

Tourists/other visitors on the premises

We're not the only ones using the site: The Zeche Zollverein is a main attraction in the area, so don't be surprised about other visitors who don't belong to the festival. Also: there are various venues on the site that we have not rented. However, you can tell by the festival ribbons who is part of our festival.

Glossary

Incomplete collection of terms that are often used in left-wing, feminist discussions.

Not all of the people at this festival have been equally concerned with all the issues that are important for an international feminist movement. Since we want to come together into a learning discussion from different experiences and contexts we have listed some terms in the following which appear again and again in (queer-)feminist debates. The short explanations are there to show that no one must feel odd because he*she may never have heard certain words. We would like to encourage you beyond the glossary to always ask questions if you do not know or understand certain words!

The glossary is not complete, we had to make a selection; and certainly some of us would describe these terms differently or disagree with our descriptions. We ask you to forgive us for this!

Agender

A person who describes themselves as agender sees themselves in the spectrum of different gender identities either non-binary – i.e. not male or female – or does not identify with any gender.

Antifeminism

As a counter movement to feminism, anti-feminism emphasises the rights and privileges of men* and boys*. Taking up right-wing theories, women* who support anti-feminism defame womens* emancipatory demands or feminist achievements and try to push them back. Among the issues contested are wage equality, the right to abortion, sexual self-determination and quotas. The term "gender" itself is also a target. Images of the enemy are purposefully built up, to which supposedly „natural“ or „normal“ conditions are presented in opposition.

Anti-Semitism

The term refers to attitudes, utterances and actions that are – directly or indirectly – against (supposedly) Jewish people, institutions and bodies. Anti-Semitism has different manifestations and functions independently of the behaviour of Jewish people; it is a projection of those who are anti-Semitic. In the anti-Semitic view of the world, „the Jews“ are held responsible for social problems, conflicts and fears. In contrast to racist thought patterns, Jews are usually regarded as powerful and superior, as secret rulers of the world. Anti-Semitic stereotypes are common in all social groups – even among people who oppose anti-Semitism.

Asexuality

Asexuality means that a person feels no, very little or very rarely sexual attraction to other people.

Bi- and Pansexuality

People who define themselves as bi fall in love with or feel sexual attraction to people of their own sex and of another sex.

A pansexual person can feel sexual or romantic feelings for people of all gender identities.

Binary

Stands for two sexes, male and female, understood as opposites. If people do not want to be classified in these categories, they often refer to themselves as non-binary.

Care

In German-speaking countries, the term care is usually translated as „Sorge, Fürsorge, fürsorgliche Praxis“ or „care work“. This includes child care, cleaning, emotional support or caring for relatives.

Cis

Cis means that people identify themselves with the sex that they were assigned at birth, i.e. not trans* self-identified.

Femme

Femme (French for „woman“) describes a form of gender presentation that is integrated into the feminine spectrum. Femme can be a feminine (trans*) woman, a man or a non-binary person.

FLTIQ*

The abbreviation stands for the German terms Frauen*, Lesben*, Trans* Inter* Queer* (in English: Women*, Lesbians*, Trans*, Inter* and Queer*).

Genderqueer

Genderqueer stands for people who cannot or do not want to integrate themselves into the binary gender model. There are different gender identities within the genderqueer spectrum. For example, people may feel that they do not belong to one gender or to several at the same time or to something completely different.

Gender and gender identity

Gender refers to a social construct that is shaped by society. The term comes from the English language, where it is used in distinction to sex, the anatomical description. The term indicates that a „biological“ sex is not assumed. Feminists have shown that gender is socially and culturally shaped by family, medicine, education and the media. Gender roles are also important for capitalism: certain jobs such as bringing up children, housework and care are still regarded as „typically female“, which legitimises the fact that they do not have to be remunerated at all or only poorly.

Gender also refers to gender identity. The predominant idea is still that there are only two

sexes, to which all people can unequivocally assign themselves. In fact, there are many gender identities, which, however, often cannot be lived as a matter of course because of the two-gender order.

Heteronormativity

The term heteronormativity refers to the fact that heterosexuality, cis- and bisexuality are understood as „natural“ or „normal“ and socially privileged. Therefore not only the assumption that there are two opposite sexes and that they are sexually related to each other is criticized. It is also condemned that heterosexuals (couples) and people with a sexually unambiguous identity are privileged in many areas of society, including marriage, family or tax law, the labour market or the allocation of housing and other resources.

Intersectionality

Inequalities and power relations cannot be understood as „either-or“. A woman* of Color is not discriminated against either as a woman* or as a person of Color but both; a Black gay man* is not discriminated against either as a person of Color or as a homosexual but both. These factors always work together and intersect. The intersectionality approach focuses on how different power relations are interwoven, depending on the context and affect the lives of individuals.

The authors of the Combahee River Collective, who see themselves as black, lesbian and socialist feminists in the USA, criticized the narrow horizons of bourgeois and white feminism in the 1970s, as well as the voids of Black liberation nationalism. They argued for a better understanding of the interlocking systems of oppression, including racism, capitalist exploitation and sexism.

Intersexuality / Inter*

Intersexual people are persons who cannot be clearly assigned to either the male or female sex physically. The somewhat more open term Inter* encompasses a wide variety of self-definitions and lifestyles of persons born with bodies that elude the medical or socially normative standard of a sexual binary .

Culturalisation

Culturalisation means determining people to a supposed „cultural belonging“ rather than characterising them by their respective competences and attitudes. It is a form of othering and racism whenever „culture“ is used synonymously with „ancestry“. Often a fundamental „cultural difference“ is assumed and differences within supposedly culturally homogeneous groups are neglected or denied.

LGBTIQ

LGBTIQ is a collective term for all people who do not see themselves as hetero and Cis. The acronym comes from the English language, where the letters stand for the following words: Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Trans, Inter, Queer. The German word is LSBTIQ.

Misgendering

Misgendering means using a false pronoun or gender in speaking about other people or with a name other than their own. This can be done unintentionally, but it can also mean a form of disregard for the person's self-definition.

Misogyny

Misogyny refers to the idea of inferiority of women* and represents a form of group-related misanthropy. Misogyny encompasses a broad spectrum of social and individual practices, (structural) discrimination and sexualised violence. Trans* misogyny refers to the particularly strong devaluation of trans* femininities.

Patriarchy

Patriarchy describes a social order in which cis men obtain a dominant position in the state and in the family. Institutions, norms and behavioural patterns are shaped, controlled and represented by cis men. The adjective to patriarchy is patriarchal.

People of Color, PoC

is an international self-designation of people with experiences of racism. The term marks a sociopolitical position and sees itself as emancipatory and in solidarity towards each other. It positions itself against racism and culturalisation as well as against discriminating othering by the white majority in society. When it comes to women*, Women* of Color (WoC) is also needed.

(Bi-/Homo-/Trans-)Phobia

Phobia comes from ancient Greek and means „fear“. Bi-, homo- or transphobia means an exaggerated and irrational aversion to gays, lesbians or trans*persons. This dislike/devaluation manifests itself in derogatory statements (e.g. insults), discriminatory behaviour (e.g. rejection of applications) and even open violence. The term (bi-/homo-/trans-) hostility is also often used.

Queer

Queer comes from English and means something like „weird“. Originally used as an insult word, the term was appropriated and today serves as a self-designation for people who do not see themselves as hetero and/or cis. Usually the term is used as a collective term for all identities that fall into the LGBTIQ spectrum, even if not all LGBTIQ persons define themselves as queer.

Racism

Racism is an ideology of oppression and was created in the course of colonialism and the enslavement trade. Racism implies a „hierarchy“ of people that refers to supposedly biological and/or cultural „criteria“. Racist arguments serve to secure and justify worldwide power and domination relations. Racism has various forms. It has a structural, institutional

and everyday effect, but is often denied. Racism prevents the equal participation of People of Color in civic, social and political affairs. One form of racism is institutional racism, which is inherent in state and non-state institutional action/non-action (lack of suffrage or representation, discrimination in access to education, employment or housing, racist police controls, etc.).

Sexism

Sexism refers to various forms of discrimination against people on the basis of their ascribed sex, as well as the underlying gender roles of the ideology that defines and hierarchises this phenomenon.

Black and Blackness

Black is a self-designation and is written in capital letters. The term marks a social position affected by racism. It is a result of the struggles of the Black women (movement) e.g. in Germany. This laid the foundation for independent Black spaces and the self-organisation of Black communities, also in Germany. A self-understanding developed in the course of this process is expressed in an extensive political, cultural and scientific work today. Self-designation is also a decisive step for processes of individual and social decolonisation.

Trans*

Trans* stands for the diversity of Trans*people and means a broad spectrum of self-definitions and lifestyles of people who do not or only partially identify with the gender assigned to them at birth, e.g. transgender, not binary gender and many others. Trans*persons (also in Germany) still struggle with a variety of structural discrimination.

Transition

Transition involves a variety of possible changes in gender identity and/or the gender assigned at birth. The process comprises a series of practical, symbolic, and possibly also medical and legal measures, usually represents a great burden due to social norms and is usually accompanied by discrimination (e.g. transphobia, homophobia).

Trigger/trigger warning

Trigger is an English word and means something that could provoke a re-traumatisation. Trigger warnings are used to let people know what they are confronted with when some content can trigger strong negative memories and/or emotions.

White and whiteness

The term white does not refer to biological characteristics, but to the specific power experiences of people and groups who are often unaware of this power. Within the social balance of power, racism is closely linked to social, political and cultural privileges. In terms of access to social resources, people who are not discriminated against by racism or anti-Semitism regardless of how they personally feel about these ideologies.

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
